# What Being Real Looks Like to Inmates....and to Kairos Volunteers- A Chaplain's View



Kairos teaches that our participants will quickly sense whether a volunteer is genuine in his compassion and concern for the state of their souls. The man whose witness they revere the most is **Rev. Charles Tolbert**, chaplain at Metro Re-entry Facility in Atlanta.

He's also one of the few people who could and does present a combination devotional and refresher security briefing every morning as the Kairos team checks into prison.

"I think of him as my grandfather," said a Metro Kairos #3 participant. In any face-to-face encounter, Charles Tolbert puts across the love of Jesus. Tolbert's congregation at Metro also realizes their chaplain can't be conned. After 19 years as a clinical chaplain with Atlanta PD, 27 years as a private investigator, and 31 years in the GDC chaplaincy, Charles Tolbert has heard it all before.

Georgia's newest Kairos team serves Metro, now meeting in preparation for its fourth post-COVID weekend. The initiative to form a team for Metro grew out of longstanding relationships between Chaplain Tolbert and volunteers, mainly from Phillips SP where he was chaplain for 11 years. The team also comprises volunteer veterans of Hayes, Hancock, Walker and Washington State Prisons.

Kairos went into Metro in 2022 when most of GDC and most Georgia Kairos programs were still finding their way out of the COVID shutdown. Tolbert's influence factored heavily in letting Kairos into Metro. The warden could be sure a Tolbert-chaperoned Kairos weekend would not make any new problems for the institution.

# **Chaplain Charles Tolbert (cont'd)**

Providentially, Kairos activities have led to no new outbreaks of COVID, either among inmates or volunteers In practice, Tolbert's commitment to the Kairos ministry proves to be as deep as any volunteer's. He tells the volunteers he loves them and he's grateful for their ministry. And his actions speak louder than words. The chaplain is in the prison, mostly with the team, for the entire 3 ½ days of the program.

A licensed preacher since 1982, ordained in 1989, Tolbert was an active disciple when the Holy Spirit led him onto the chaplaincy scene. He was leading ministries for the incarcerated, the newly released, and the homeless. A policeman in his congregation told him about a need for police chaplains. He applied and soon found himself at the police academy getting trained. During his 19 years with the Atlanta PD, he earned Chaplain of the Year honors from the Atlanta force and from the DeKalb NAACP.

The move into state corrections chaplaincy was a natural step for Tolbert. He served at Rockdale, Helms, A.L. Burruss, Phillips and Metro Re-entry, and at the GDC central office.

At Phillips, Tolbert's assignment was mental health chaplain. It was at Phillips that he witnessed Kairos ministry in action. "We had these mental health cases in there, erratic or completely closed off to interaction. And we had some hard cases, too mean to talk to anybody. I watched the Kairos people reach out to those guys and show them the love of God. The Kairos volunteers changed those men's lives in four days. It wasn't just the food they were reacting to. It was the love of God," he said.

The Phillips Kairos Team would go on to bless their chaplain when he spent a year recuperating from surgery. They would check on him every day and offer to fetch anything he needed, he said. Once when he was to be recognized at a GDC meeting, the team showed up in force and packed the room, standing and applauding when his name was called.

Charles Tolbert was serving as coordinator of volunteer services at the GDC home office in the early 2000s, and it fell to him to present the volunteer training. Now mercifully streamlined to about three hours, in 2004 the volunteer training ran for six hours. Volunteers heard Tolbert present the whole program unassisted, without notes. His delivery was folksy, but his candor, credibility and command of the material were just unshakeable, still remembered by the volunteers Tolbert trained.

#### Washington #25 (5/10/23)



**Phillips #27 – (6/22/23) -** After four years, Kairos was finally able to go back into Phillips! We had eighteen inside candidates and twenty volunteer outside team members. The following comments were heard during open mic on Saturday evening:

"With the letters, I didn't think I was going to make it through the rest of the day."

"20 years ago I met Jesus and He changed my life....

.I have learned this weekend not to let the pain of my past ruin my future."

"Forgiveness is the most important thing – and we all need it."

#### In what spiritual condition did I arrive for the Weekend?

Slightly depleted battery, thirsty, needed some spiritual repairs, having a spiritual battle, spiritually drained, lost and angry, in spiritual disarray, with questions for God, searching for a connection, spiritually unbalanced, with an open mind and no expectations, came with my guard up.

#### What did I receive while here?

# **Toffee Apricot Oat Cookies**

#### Ingredients

- 1/2 cup unsalted butter (4 ounces), softened
- 1/3 cup granulated sugar
- 1/3 cup packed light muscovado sugar or light brown sugar
- 1 large egg
- 1 cup all-purpose flour (about 4 1/4 ounces)
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/4 teaspoon kosher salt
- 2/3 cup uncooked old-fashioned regular rolled oats (about 2 ounces)
- 1/2 cup chopped milk chocolate
- 1/3 cup finely chopped toffee
- 1/3 cup dried apricots (about 2 ounces), finely chopped



Preheat oven to 325°F with oven racks in top third and lower third of oven.

Combine butter, granulated sugar, and muscovado sugar in bowl of a stand mixer fitted with the paddle attachment; beat on medium speed until light and creamy, 3 to 4 minutes. Add egg and beat until combined. With mixer running on low speed, gradually add flour, vanilla extract, baking soda, and salt, beating until just combined, about 30 seconds. Stir in oats, chocolate, toffee, and apricots just until combined.

Line 2 rimmed baking sheets with parchment paper. Using a 13/4-inch scoop, drop mounds of dough (about 2 tablespoons each) onto prepared baking sheets, spacing dough mounds 1 1/2 inches apart.

Bake in preheated oven until cookies are lightly browned, 12 to 16 minutes, rotating pans top to bottom after 8 minutes. Let cookies cool on baking sheets 5 minutes.

Transfer cookies to a wire rack, and let cool completely, about 30 minutes.

# **Volunteer Renewal Process**



#### Follow these easy steps to renew your volunteer badge:

- 1. Go to gdc.ga.gov
- 2. Scroll down to "Volunteer Opportunities" and click "Get Involved"
- 3. On the left side of the page, click "Volunteer Renewal Application"
- 4. Scroll down and click "FILL OUT THE RENEWAL FORM"
- 5. When this page opens, note that the page is for <u>renewals</u> only. If you are a new applicant, click the link on this page that says "NEW APPLICATION PROCESS"
- 6. Complete the info with your name, badge number, and expiration date, click that you are not a robot, then click "Submit." This will take you to the correct screen.
- 7. Watch the videos (these are the same videos you saw at your training session). This will take at least 30-40 minutes.
- 8. Once the videos have finished, follow the remaining instructions to complete the app renewal.
- 9. When this part of the process is completed, look for the email notification that your renewal has been received.

### **Words of Encouragement For All Kairos Volunteers**

ISAIAH 6:8-9 - Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying," whom shall I send? And who will go for us? And I said, "Here am I. Send me!"

Greetings my Brothers and Sisters!

More prisons are re-opening and Isaiah 6:8 reminds us that sharing the Gospel is an honor. We have been sent by God to spread the Gospel of Jesus Christ. So, God help us to be faithful and realize that no matter what we say, apart from the power of the Spirit of God to open eyes and open hearts, we cannot bring people to a relationship with God.

Our joy is to participate because God is no respecter of persons! All He wants is a willing heart. Isaiah was the same one that cried out "woe to me! I am ruined! For I am a man of unclean lips, and I live among a people of unclean lips." But just like Isaiah, God can use you to change a prison as well as change a nation.

Around 150 years ago, there was a great revival in Wales England, and many of the missionaries went from England to the northeast part of India to spread the Gospel to a tribal community that was very primitive and aggressive. These tribesmen were called head-hunters. One day a Welsh missionary spreading the message of Jesus Christ succeeded in converting a man, his wife, and two children.

The man's faith became so contagious that many of the villagers began to accept Christianity. The village chief got so angry about what was happening that he summoned all the villagers and the family who was first converted to renounce their faith in public or face execution. Being moved by the Holy Spirit, the man sung his reply, "I have decided to follow Jesus. No turning back."

Enraged at the refusal of the man, the chief ordered his archers to shoot the children. Then the chief asked, "Will you deny your faith? If not, you will lose your wife too." But the man replied again singing, "Though none go with me, still I will follow. No turning back." This chief was so angry with the man's defiance, he ordered the killing of the man's wife also. He then said, "I will give you one more opportunity to deny your faith and live." But in the face of death, the man sang, "The cross before me, the world behind me. No turning back." He was executed for his faith along with his family.
